How Much Does a Walk-In Tub Cost?

The cost of a walk-in tub depends mostly on the size, type, features, and brand. A basic walk-in tub with only standard safety features can cost anywhere from \$2,000 to \$5,000. If you are looking for a walk-in tub with special features, such as wheelchair accessibility or whirlpool jets, you can expect the average cost to run as high as \$5,000 to \$15,000. Note that professional labor and installation costs an additional \$1,500 to \$3,200 on average, bringing the total average cost range for a walk-in tub to \$3,500 to \$18,000.

Starting at around \$3,300, these units typically include standard safety and convenience features like handheld showerheads and easy-to-use door mechanisms. As you move towards the higher end of the price range, you can expect to find enhanced features such as advanced water jets, more sophisticated shower systems, and luxury finishes. The most expensive models, which can cost up to \$8,500, might also offer custom styling options, superior materials, and the latest in ergonomic and accessibility design.

The price range begins at \$5,000, which typically includes basic features such as a door for easy entry and hydrotherapy options. As the price increases, more luxurious features like advanced jet systems, heated backrests, and superior ergonomic designs become available. The top end of the price spectrum, around \$8,000, generally includes the highest quality materials, the most advanced technology in hydrotherapy and insulation, and often more stylish design options.

# Hydromassage Walk-In Tub

Hydromassage walk-in tubs, also known as jacuzzi walk-in tubs, offer therapeutic water jet massage features. The starting price of \$4,400 usually covers basic jet systems and essential safety features. As the price goes up, the sophistication of the jet systems increases, offering more options for massage intensity and targeted therapy. The most expensive models in this category, costing as much as \$12,500, typically feature state-of-the-art hydrotherapy technology, customizable jet configurations, and additional luxury amenities like chromotherapy lighting and built-in sound systems.

## Two-Person Walk-In Tub

Two-person walk-in tubs are designed for simultaneous use by two individuals. Starting at around \$5,500, these tubs offer basic features such as dual seating and safety features suitable for two users. The price increases with the addition of luxury elements such as individualized jet controls, larger and more sophisticated designs, and high-end materials. The top of the price range, reaching up to \$12,500, often includes the most advanced hydrotherapy systems, customized features for comfort and accessibility, and premium finishes for a luxurious bathing experience.

Walk-in tubs are usually made from acrylic or gel-coated fiberglass, each with distinct advantages and costs.

## Acrylic Walk-In Tubs

Acrylic tubs, known for their durability and glossy finish, resist scratches and fading, maintaining their appearance over time. Prices range from \$4,000 to \$10,000, influenced by features like hydrotherapy jets and customization options. High-end models include more advanced designs and features, driving costs toward the upper range.

## Gel-Coated Fiberglass Walk-In Tubs

Gel-coated fiberglass tubs are lighter, less durable, and more affordable, costing \$2,500 to \$6,000. They are ideal for budget-conscious buyers but may compromise longevity and wear resistance compared to acrylic models.

Labor and installation costs depend on where you live, the size of the tub, the complexity of labor needed to install the tub, the removal and disposal of an old tub, and any electrical and plumbing adjustments your bathroom may require. Installation costs can also rise if you need a new water heater to support the new tub.

Below you can find a breakdown of average labor and installation costs you may need to account for:

Popular Walk-In Tub Features and Costs

Basic safety features of a walk-in tub include grab bars, anti-slip flooring, and low thresholds. But your walk-in tub might need more than the basic features. In that case, you can expect to see the total installation price go up a bit. Here's what to expect from each of these potential features and what they should cost.

The handheld shower wand can cost anywhere from \$50 to \$200 or more, depending on the complexity and style.

Massage Jets

These jets, either powered by water or air, can add \$3,000 to \$8,000 to the cost of a typical walk-in tub. If you choose to customize the jets to suit certain target areas of the body, you might be looking at a bit higher cost.

Installation will also need to include electrical work to run the jets, which can range from a few hundred dollars to a few thousand, depending upon how much work is required to bring the bathroom up to code.

## Grab Bars

Your walk-in tub should come equipped with at least one set of grab bars, but what if you need more? Basic, strong, sturdy grab bars cost an average of \$50 to \$100 each. These should be professionally installed, as they must be solidly attached to studs to provide adequate protection to catch someone who is falling. More modern models can cost a bit more.

#### Quick Drain Technology

In most cases, this comes standard with the tub. If it doesn't, expect to add about \$250 to the cost of the tub. The installation cost can go up because of this feature, as you might need to widen the pipes to accommodate it.

Depending upon the configuration of your bathroom and what needs to be done to make it work, you might look at a cost between \$350 and \$1,800. However, we recommend being on the lookout for this technology when comparing walk-in tub brands.

#### Headrests

Some walk-in tubs are molded with a headrest. You can also purchase a separate headrest that you can customize to fit however you please. Count on about \$250, on average, for either option. Heated headrests can cost as much as \$400 each.

#### Aromatherapy or Chromatherapy

The use of colors or scents to make the bath a more pleasurable experience – as well as provide therapeutic benefits – is a great way to enhance relaxation in your walk-in tub. Expect to add \$200 to \$350 to the final cost of each feature.

## Custom Seat or Bench

Adding a custom seat to your tub, including those that warm up and keep the tub cozy while you use it, can add to the bottom line. That seat might cost between \$500 and \$800 on average, depending on the size of the seat.

Water Heater Upgrade: Walk-in tubs use more hot water. Upgrading your water heater can cost \$600 to \$3,000, depending on size and type.
